Chloe said she texted her friends a lot.



Direct speech

What people actually say written in quotation marks

"I text my friends a lot."



Reported speech

How we later say the exact meaning of what the speaker said but <u>not</u> the exact words. So we make some changes.

Chloe *said* she texted her friends a lot.



Reported Speech — Tenses

Direct speech

Present Simple

"I like new gadgets."

Past Simple

"I bought my mobile last week."

Present Perfect

"I have bought a new mobile."

Future simple

"I will buy a smartphone."

Reported speech

Past Simple

She said she liked new gadgets.

Past Perfect

She said she had bought her mobile last week.

Past Perfect

She said she had bought a new mobile.

Conditional

She said she would buy a smartphone.



Reported Speech — Tenses

Direct speech

Present Continuous

"I'm using my new smartphone."

Modals (Present)

"You should see my new tablet."

Imperative

"Be nice to people!"

"Don't post personal information!"

Reported speech

Past Continuous

She said she was using her new smartphone.

Modals (Past)

She said she should see her new tablet.

Infinitive

She told me to be nice to people.

The teacher told me not to post personal information.

Reporting verbs / Introductory verbs

- We use these verbs to report what was said before
- The most common verbs are say and tell



Say

Mark *said* he liked technology.



Mark *told* the children he liked technology.
